PRINCIPAL'S REFLECTION

Some educators think the first two weeks are the most important time in the school year for all children, whatever their age. What happens during this critical period can determine a student's engagement for the rest of the year. Students return from summer holidays to find new classes, new teachers, new books, and new friends. All of these novelties come with the hope that this year could be different and better than all previous years. However, when staff administer their first tests and give out grades, it is very easy for some students to feel burdened for the rest of the year; students who receive a 'C' on that first maths quiz begin to see themselves as C students. Their uncertainty suddenly becomes fixed, and they begin to accept the idea that they are likely to earn C's in maths for the rest of the year. When the second quiz or assessment occurs, they expect to receive another C. When they do, it reinforces their perception. The same is true of initial failing grades and initial A's.

Staff at St Patrick's are participating in a three-year professional learning course, 'Visible Learning' with the intention to focus on positive influences in education from the twenty years of research by Professor John Hattie. I have referred to the US championship coach John Wooden in previous Newsletters, however, it is timely to highlight his 'simple' strategy that gained significant success in heightening expectations: he provided immediate feedback that was concise, explicit and unambiguously accurate; modelling the right skill; correcting if required; remodelling. There are many dimensions that teachers contend with that Wooden did not have to factor-in to his coaching regime, however, his philosophy complements 'cognitive load theory' in that sharply focused explicit teaching and the careful use of formative assessment enhances opportunities for learning and, consequently, excellence.

Students are, temperamentally, at various levels of being able to display self-control, be self-directed, self-regulate and self-manage their learning, and the irrefutable fact is that no-one can learn **for** someone else - it is when the student engages in the learning process that has been carefully crafted by a teacher who is striving for excellence, that we, as parents and teachers can find delight, because it is the love of learning, coupled with a realisation that there is a responsibility for being intrinsically motivated, that the excellence becomes less about competition and more about complementing a life that is richly satisfying. Students

will try hard and persist in areas in which they feel they can succeed, and will avoid areas where they believe they'll fail. One of the most important tasks for our staff at the start of the year is to keep alive that sense of optimism and hope that will enthuse their students and keep them working purposefully for the rest of the year. We look forward to working with parents to help keep education a positive, rewarding experience for all involved, with a hope reflected well by Paul in his Epistle to the Romans, "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

Prep News (Mrs Jak)

Prep have settled in very well to their first week of school and Prep routines. We welcome our new students Hudson D, Kashaf, Cohen and Blair to our class. This year is going to be an educational, social and physical year of growth for your child. It will be very rewarding to participate in and to observe your child develop their reading, writing, spelling, mathematical and general knowledge skills.

This term we will be learning that words are made up of sounds and the sounds are represented by letters (spelling), and we will progress to learning how to write a sentence. A big focus this term will be developing comprehension skills to ensure that students understand what they are reading. To get off to a good start, I strongly encourage each child to read in the classroom of a morning with an adult and for the students to complete a fine motor activity. This is a great routine to get into, to start the day in a focused way ready to learn. In Mathematics we will be exploring numbers (digits), amounts and number words. We will be learning how to subitize amounts (automatically know a given amount). In Religion we will learn about our Christian Life and God's Love. In History we are going to learn about our own history and the past. Reading is encouraged every night.

Information in regards to supporting your child with reading is enclosed in their Home Reader plastic pocket. Please ensure ALL school clothing and shoes are labelled with your child's name. Our Teacher Assistant in Prep is Mrs D'Arne Adams. We look forward to working with you to nurture and educate your child.



This program involves considerable focus on communicating to parents the learning intentions of important activities that are associated with early years learning. Year 1 News (Mr O'Brien)

Welcome to all the students in Year 1. We had a great first week back last week and are looking forward to big first term. Year 1 has already had a taste of what is to come and they seem excited for what is ahead. In Term 1 we are learning all about pets. Our unit on pets will provide a lot of learning opportunities including –

- English Descriptive writing
- Maths Measuring and Graphing
- Science Categorising and features of living things
- Design and Technology Design solutions for our pets

In addition, in English we will be spending this term looking at writing short informative texts focusing on punctuation. In Maths we will be primarily looking at number. If there is any room left in the term after all of that, then we might try and get into the garden!

REMINDER: School Swimming Carnival - Thursday 11th March

A final program will be distributed to families next week, however, a summary of the day includes:

- 9.30am 12.30pm Students in Years 3, 4, 5 & 6 will be involved in swimming events and some novelty events at the Latrobe pool. Students should bring a plastic or
 - other small bag with their towel and any change of clothes to take with them to the pool rather than take their school bag to and from the pool.
- 12.30pm 2.30pm Students in Prep, Year 1, Year 2 will be involved in novelty events at the Latrobe pool according to the following timetable:
 - 12.00pm: Years 1 & 2 students have lunch at school.
 - 12.20pm: Year 2 walk to the pool for a supervised free swim of 45 minutes (12.30-1.15pm)
 - 1.00pm: Year 1 walk to the pool for a supervised free swim of 45 minutes (1.15-2.00pm)
 - 1.30pm: Prep walk to the pool for a supervised free swim of 40 minutes (1.50-2.30pm)

Students in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 will be participating in races for selection to represent the school at the NW Catholic Schools' Swimming Carnival that will be conducted in Burnie - this carnival is to be confirmed in regards to possible COVID-19 restrictions. The school canteen will still operate on this day and Sunscreen will be provided by the school and available at the pool for students to apply, however, parents may prefer their child or children to apply their own sunscreen, which would need to be supplied by the parents. Parents may take children home from the pool provided school staff are informed prior to the day please to ensure their child or children bring their school bags to the pool - school bags will be left at school unless teachers are informed that a child will be taken home from the pool by a parent. Parents of children in Prep, Years 1 and 2 may assist their own child only in the change rooms please.



Check in TAS App - Digital COVID check in at St Patrick's

St Patrick's is now registered to use the 'Check in TAS' COVID registration App. This App allows you to simply scan a QR code using your smartphone or smart device when you are entering the school for a period longer than 10 minutes, rather than filling out a register by hand. Please see the image to the right for instructions on how to download and use the App. We will have the QR codes placed at the front office, in the entrance to the school hall and in Kindergarten. It is important that you either use this App or the handwritten register so that contact tracing can be undertaken if necessary.

2021 School Fees Invoice and Payment Arrangements

We are currently in the process of updating our accounting program to TechOne which is due to go live by the 5th March. We will be issuing the 2021 School Fee invoices from the TechOne program after this date. Yellow Slips

If your child makes an inappropriate choice at school, depending on the severity of the incident, they will likely be required to have a time-out at Recess or Lunch and will subsequently receive a Yellow Slip to bring home. This slip will be placed in the child's diary and, after speaking with your child, it is important that the bottom section is signed by a parent/guardian and returned in the diary the very next school day. If you require further clarification of the incident, please contact Mr Linhart or staff at the school office. Students should bring the signed slip to the front office when they arrive at school in the morning. If the signed slip is not returned on the next school day, the student may be required to have an additional time-out. Thank you in advance for your support.
