PRINCIPAL'S REFLECTION

Abraham Lincoln, a man who knew deeply the significance of responsibility, of loss and achievement and how these two words shadow each other, said, "I have been driven many times upon my knees by the overwhelming conviction that I had no-where else to go. My own wisdom and that of all about me seemed insufficient for that day." The Gospel reading from Luke last weekend focused on a favourite topic; the **strength of humility**, which appears at odds of our usual view that situates humility as being vulnerable virtue, associated with being subservient.

The Gospel passage told of how our human desires to be noticed, to gain influence by style, rather than substance, is not what God wants - the Gospel spoke volumes about how our responses in regards to social justice, hospitality and compassion - two of our school Mercy values - speaks more about us than does our appearance and persona.

The message of ambition and seeking what is deemed 'good' is not undermined; however, if, our pursuit comes at the expense of others who are disadvantaged by our actions, then last weekend's Gospel reading resonates strongly as a message that demands our reflection and action. As a school that endeavours to view our actions through a WEST (Welcoming; Encouraging; Sorry; Thankful) lens, the virtue of humility is, arguably, an imperative. We cannot welcome others if we do not have a sense of their importance (hence a degree of humility on our behalf); we cannot encourage others if we do not have a sense of another's worth; we cannot say sorry if we do not appreciate our own failings at times; we cannot thank others unless we have a sense of gratitude, which is itself an expression of subtle humility.

Today's Newsletter contains many pictures that endeavour to capture the spirit and character of our school of which I am proud - our basketball and soccer commitments, our recent Father's Day prayer service and breakfast, class news, P & F news, our involvement in community outreach such as Mini-Vinnies. However, it is a pride couched in the humility of appreciating how it is through the united and focused **efforts of many** that we

can cherish a culture that both appreciates excellence, whilst acknowledging how this journey is often a **personal undertaking**.

Year 5's Animal Collage Art (Mrs Kingshott)

A part of Year 5's Visual Art experiences students have used many elements of art to create a collage of an animal. Firstly, the students created a crayon pattern on A3 cardboard depicting different types and thickness of lines, shapes and colours. Some students also applied a coat of paint over the crayon patterns. These individual creations were then torn into strips to then be shared with other members of the classroom giving each piece of art work a communal element. The torn strips had to glued in a radiating formation onto a larger sheet of cardboard. Students used crayons and paint, to add detail to the eyes and noses. Once the facial features were glued in place, the last step was to add the detail of the mouths, ears, fur or feathers. The students are looking forward to sharing their finished collages in assembly.

Mathematics Books

Teachers sent student Mathematics books home with children last week. This hopefully allowed parents the opportunity to review some of the work that is covered in class, to engage in some focused conversations with children and to provide scope for similarly focused conversations with teachers. The home-school partnership is a crucial support relationship for student progress and parents are welcome to note in their child's diary or ring the school office to organise parent-student-teacher meetings to discuss any aspect of a child's education at St Patrick's. Religion books will be sent home during week ten, the final week of term 3, for further parent-child conversations.

Year 1 Maths

This term Year 1 started looking at place value. We started with a pile of icy pole sticks - wondering how many were there? We talked about finding an easier way to count them all. So we bundled the sticks up into groups of ten and then set to counting. There was 1766 icy pole sticks! We have also been looking at modelling numbers with tens and ones.




